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Hidden Kensington: Georgian Fashion

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Hidden Kensington GEORGIAN FASHION

Four kings... Innumerable courtiers... Uncounted lovers... One palace...

This month local resident Jenny Davis-Peccoud looks into the fashions that paraded through the halls and chambers of Kensington Palace during the Georgian era.

The Georgian era spans the reigns of four Georges, the first Hanoverian kings of Britain. It started in 1714, ended in 1830 and encapsulated the Regency period from 1811-1820. Kensington Palace played a central role early on, as the chosen residence of both George I and George II. After Queen Caroline's death in 1737, the palace fell out of favour, and neither of the later Georges chose to live there.

In its heyday, though, the palace was the glamorous set for the dramas, tragedies and comedies that played out at the British court. George II and his cultured wife Caroline hosted lavish parties, where courtiers would strive to outdo each other in the latest fashions.

Let's start with the men. Embroidered suits were all the rage - short trousers topped by ruffled collars, extravagant waistcoats and cut-away jackets. Every gentleman carried a ceremonial sword and wore a wig. And most also carried a flat, unwearable version of a hat - to doff without ruffling their locks when they passed in front of the monarch.

Ladies wore the latest style of 'mantua', an ultrawide dress which became ever more popular, and ever wider, as the period wore on. It was tightly laced on the top, with three rows of frills for sleeves. The skirts were made of heavy folds of embroidered material, supported by an elaborate dress hoop underneath. The hoops, fabricated from whalebone, made it hard to walk, so ladies took very small steps and appeared to glide across the floor. Forget about sitting down.

Ladies bedecked themselves with fine jewels and always carried a fan. In fact, a whole language developed around ladies' fans. As intimate encounters were rife at court, these subtle signals were required for both sides of the game. Lucy Worsley, Chief Curator at Historic Royal Palaces, suggests that the ladies painted by William Kent on the walls at Kensington Palace are all saying

variations of 'I am married', 'I wish to get rid of you' or just plain 'no'.

Visitors can relive some of the glamour of these days during the "Glorious Georges" season at Kensington Palace. The State Apartments have been restored to the style of George II, with many contemporary artefacts on display. Each day people can view Queen Caroline getting dressed in the silver "Rockingham mantua" and associated under-garments.

On July 9th, the Georgian Fashion Remix show will profile "clothes and accessories from the collections of contemporary British fashion designers who have taken inspiration from Georgian silhouettes, materials and decoration". The Orangery, built in 1761, provides the perfect backdrop for this event. (Tickets £25.)

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History of Kensington: BIBA: Fashion in the 1960s By Sarah Goldsmith

In early 1960's Britain, children born in the "baby boom" following World War II were in their mid-to-late teens. The economy was finally emerging from its post-war stalemate and London was on the verge of "swinging" again. The problem, though, for any 17, 18, 19-year old, with their first disposable income at hand, was where to buy clothes; according to Barbara Hulanicki, the landscape was "desperate."

In 1963, Barbara and her husband, Stephen Fitz-Simon, began a mail-order company out of their apartment on Cromwell Road, with a post office box on Oxord Street. Within a week after placing an ad in the Daily Mirror for a gingham dress with a matching headscarf, they had hundreds of responses. In all, they sold 17,000 dresses for £1.25. With their marginal profit, they opened a store at 87 Abingdon Road, in the back of an old chemist's shop. Fitted with Victorian furniture and with an air of Art Nouveau, the shop was so small that the fitting room was almost non-existent. When the store first opened, there was one brown stripe smock dress in stock in only one size. It sold out that day.

Meanwhile, Cathy McGowan from the popular television show Ready Steady Go had begun to wear Biba clothing, influencing these new hoards of teenagers looking for inexpensive yet trendy clothing. By 1966, Biba moved to larger digs at 19-21 Kensington Church Street. The clothes were a response to the 'Mod silhouette" which Barbara later criticized as being only for very skinny women. Instead, the clothes she designed worked on three-dimensional figures, allowing the wearer to appear skinnier. Additionally, the clothes played to new assets; whereas the focus had been on the upper part of the female body, Hulanicki's clothes showcased the legs. Whilst other fashion designers, notably Mary Quant, had begun this trend and had shown short skirts, Biba was the first store to sell the miniskirt. The colors were also different, focusing on what were called "auntie" colors (purples, browns, mustards), instead of pastels or primary colors. Now teenagers had a place to shop, and they populated

Biba in droves. In 1966, Biba was named "the most 'in' shop for girls" by Time magazine.

Three years later, the store moved to High Street Kensington, and soon its owners weren't referring to it as a clothing brand but as a lifestyle. Biba had grown a bit too fast, and soon it was formed into a limited company with Dorothy Perkins owning the majority. It was at this point that Biba began both its ascent and its decline. In a story all too familiar in Kensington's history, as the store grew more popular, it expanded at a greater pace, and it all proved unsustainable. In 1973, British Land bought out Dorothy Perkins and Biba moved to the mutli-story Derry and Toms building on High Street Kensington. In less than 10 years, Biba went from a mail-order business to a seven-story lush, "sexy" department store, capped off by the Kensington Roof Gardens and a Rainbow Room where Mick Jagger and Marianne Faithfull hung out. In 1974, it all came to a head with a property crash, and a year later, the British Land Company closed the store. For a brief moment, all eyes were on this funky, art deco-inspired store with its clothes to match, first filling a void, but then expanding on a parallel level with the needs and economy of its baby boomer clientele. Though Biba in its original form barely lasted a decade, its legacy lives on in the High Street of today.

'Small hats are fashionable this year, says Gina, 'also Coolie hats' (disc like creations, cunningly styled to stay on in the wind). All Gina's hats have invisible elastic to keep them in place. She also favours 'cocktail hats' - tiny confections of feathers and veiling, as 'fascinators have got themselves a bad name.' Her window this year features mostly neutrals with delicious

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
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












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Landscape and Horticulture by Benedict Bull The Fashioning of a Button Hole

The button hole has come to mind today that the English Season is underway. It is conducted under a garland of flowers that has changed somewhat over the years. Lucy has pointed out to me that the theme of this June edition is fashion and nowhere is the language of flowers more prominent than mounted on our very lapel.


The camellia and the carnation in particular have a whole series of cultivars and crops dedicated to servicing the buttonholes of elite gentlemen. I like the single white selections or even a scented dianthus with the 1920s and 1930s selections remaining unsurpassed to my sagging, middleaged eyes.

The buttonhole precedes all the modern rhetoric and bombast of the steel-clasped virtual gardens mounted in the house or on the wall. It is a slit of a textile lapel where our own industrialist and consumerist garden begins as it is a testament to our passing vanity and the debasement of our proper understanding of the role and value of plants in our society. Look at the iconography of plants in the fifteenth century compared to those sported now. How rich, subtle and kind compared to our modern, superficial fixation with form and colour. What can you expect

though with a refrigerated super lorry of flowers parking in Holland Park Avenue once a week? Buying flowers there is like going to a colour chart and selecting a bra based on colour and cup size! Where is the sinew and ingenuity of confirmation in that patient reader?

In pseudo-modernist fashion I do not sport a buttonhole myself, feigning good manners as a regular member at the races or passing off quietly at the back of a wedding. But behind these circumstantial shimmies lies the reality in that I am lazy and prefer flower heads on the plant, unless I have a specific message to convey without words. And if I have something in mind then that is not something I would purchase but something I would cultivate with my own hands or loot from a hedgerow.

So on what pretext then do we carry garlands in our bleak attire? 'Better embroidery hidden', I answer to dry the tears. Surely not only ushers, grooms, brides and coffins, where a bit of weight is required, sported only by the extremely pretty, monstrous ugly or significant relations somewhat between, or one purporting as a heavily swagged emissary of another realm, or a boating man saluting a monarch or some such like dignitary....

PIZZA EXPRESS (or a guide on how to choose your pizza) by Ffiona

To paraphrase Bill Clinton, "It's all about the pizza, stupid!"

In 1965 the brand was launched in Wardour Street by a visionary chef/entrepreneur, Peter Boizot. He knocked down a wall in order to install the Italian oven in which he baked high quality, authentic pizza. Two years later, he teamed up with artist Enzo Apicella to open his second restaurant, next to the British Museum. The design created by Apicella complemented perfectly the food, creating a template for all the other restaurants that followed. Our local is situated just off High Street Kensington, perfect for refuelling whilst shopping, or for a pre or post cinema meal.

The menu is comprehensive, well designed and has something for everyone. As you would expect, there are starters, sides, salads, and baked dishes. However, if you visit PizzaExpress, there is really only one choice, the pizza. These are what this restaurant is all about and there are plenty to choose from. The menu includes: the classic pizza (these date from the 1965 Wardour Street menu), Leggera Pizza (all under 500 calories), Romana Pizza, Calzone and, a touch that many will appreciate, there are gluten free choices as well.

Everyone should try one of the Classic Pizza. All the old favourites are here: Four Seasons, La Reine, Giadiniera etc. However, I love simplicity and usually have the Margherita. There is nowhere to hide with one of these, the tomato sauce must be full of flavour and substantial enough to support the creamy mozzeralla on top; PizzaExpress never disappoints. With one of their salads or coleslaw and a glass of ice cold Prosecco, I'm in heaven.

If you prefer the pizza base to be thin and crispy, go for the Romana range (although you can also ask for this thinner base to accompany the classic pizza as well).

Of the 14 topping available, the Caprina Rossa is worth a mention. It combines beetroot, creamy goat's cheese, red onions, garlic and mozzeralla. Once baked, it is garnished with Gran Moravia cheese, rocket and pesto and lemon. Complex flavours and a simple base. Pizza perfection.

The Leggera range of low calorie dishes uses the same thin base, but it is baked as a ring, the middle being filled with salad. The Spring menu also includes a Risotto Fresco (less than 300 calories) comprising oak roasted salmon, garlic and parsley in a cream and white wine sauce.

Do not skip dessert. Vanilla Panna Cotta, Summer Pudding, Double Chocolate Expresso Torta and Gelati sit with Dolcetti or Legera Sorbets together with a range of gluten free desserts. These will leave a sweet taste as you plan your next visit to a unique chain of restaurants where quality and a warm welcome are the enduring hallmarks of its success.

Sports Day Winners - Perfect for sports day, these brownies are designed to give you the edge for that all important race...

2 x 300g packs of ready cooked beetroots 100g unsalted butter (chopped small) 200g dark chocolate (min 70% cocoa) 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 250g caster sugar 3 eggs 100g plain flour 25g cocoa

Buttered baking tin oven preheated to 180C (350F/Gas 4).

Grate the beetroot and warm through in a saucepan, drain off excess liquid via a sieve and put in a blender with butter, vanilla and chocolate. The chocolate and butter should melt, whizz mixture up until very smooth. In a bowl whisk up the eggs and sugar until pale and foamy, carefully fold in the beetroot mix using a metal spoon, and then sift in the flour and cocoa powder, fold in to try to conserve as much air as possible. Pour the mixture into a baking tin and cook for 25 minutes. The brownie should be risen and have a little wobble. When cool, cut into squares.

Beetroots are seasonal from June to October. They are rich in potassium, fibre, folic acid, antioxidants and nitrate. The nitrate in beetroot provides two advantages to the sportsman. It is converted into nitric oxide, which widens the blood vessels - increasing blood flow, and also reduces the amount of oxygen required by muscles to work efficiently, meaning you have more stamina.



Cacao supports oxygen uptake resulting in more energy and the sugar will give you some instant energy to speed off the starting blocks.

Book Review:


May We Be Forgiven by a.m. Holmes

What happens when the American Dream goes wrong? That is the central theme of this fascinating novel. Published in 2012, it has received mixed reviews. Some bemoan a lack of plot, others accuse the author of not having developed her characters sufficiently, and whilst there may be some truth in these points, the fact remains that she has constructed a masterful analysis of the destructive force of modern life, managing to inject the darkest themes with a shot of high octane humour.

The action revolves around two brothers, George and Harry Silver. George, the elder brother, was born a bully and age has not mellowed him. A very successful television executive, he is married with two children and a beautiful house in the New York suburbs. Blessed with all the material trappings that are supposed to generate happiness, he has attained a level of arrogance that most mortals could only dream of. His younger brother, Harry, is an academic. He specialises in Nixon about whom he has been writing a book for most of his career. His home life with wife Claire appears as arid and unappealing as his day job.

One November afternoon, Harry is helping his sister-in-law, Jane, clear away the remnants of the Thanksgiving dinner. In the kitchen, Jane suddenly leaves the washing up and kisses Harry with passion before calmly returning to the family to serve dessert and coffee. Shaken, Harry is left to wonder about the significance of the kiss. A few weeks later, George crashes into a car, killing the parents of a young boy. The authorities sensing that George is not "normal" send him to a hospital to assess his mental state. Harry is asked to keep Jane company and they continue where the kiss left off. One night, George unexpectedly returns home and calmly kills Jane. Harry is left to look after George's house and pets and comfort his nephew and niece whist George is held in a secure psychiatric unit.



As the story unfolds, the question arises, is the book about George or Harry? Are the problems Harry faces in trying to console George's two children, care for his pets and deal with life now that his wife is divorcing him, of his own making or are they down to his brother's actions? Alternatively, is the book about George coming to terms with his true nature and trying to understand himself? In their own ways, both brothers are seeking redemption, but from whom and why?

The book unfolds at high speed and the relentless pace of events and dialogue never slackens. Seen through Harry's eyes the life of this dysfunctional family is told with humour that almost masks the blackness of the situations the brothers face. It is hilarious, compulsive and satisfying reading as little by little the pieces fall into place. Keep your evenings free as once you start, you won't be able to put it down.

Science Bites: The Arrival of Lab Grown Organs by Dr Alex Anderson

Growing human organs outside the body may sound like a scene from a science fiction film, but several recent studies have shown that this is becoming reality. Patients who have skin cancer on their nose often need to have large areas of it removed. To replace the excised areas, cartilage from other areas of the body is usually used (which can be painful and lead to complications).

In April, scientists at the University of Basel (led by Professor Ivan Martin) published in the medical journal The Lancet an alternative reconstructive therapy1. They took a 6mm piece of a patient's own nasal cartilage and allowed specific cells to expand. These were then seeded onto a membrane scaffold and allowed to grow until they formed a thin layer, which was shaped to the correct size before being implanted into the same patient's wound.

Although this study was only on five patients, the results after a year showed very few complications. Other organs and tissues have also been successfully created from patient's own cells before being implanted back into them, and becoming functional.





These include lab grown vaginas, which have been successfully implanted into four patients2, as well as a trachea (windpipe)3.

These studies show that we are beginning to be able to replace some of the tissues and organs of people who lack them as a result of accidents or diseases.

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
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
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
