



WINTERTON ON SEA PARISH COUNCIL NEWSLETTER - JULY/AUGUST 2010



Winterton Parish Council Meeting held on Thursday 15 July 2010 in the Church Room

Eight residents were welcomed to the meeting and it was stated that the meeting is held in accordance with the Parish Council Standing Orders and Code of Conduct.

The PCSO Roger Bellward was unable to attend. However, it was reported that there had been four crimes in the village since last month.

The following **Planning Applications** were considered:

06/10/0356/F – Two storey side extension at 27 Bulmer Lane. Winterton Parish Council had no objections.

06/10/0311/F – Proposed 1.8m fence at 9 The Cobbleways. Winterton Parish Council had no objections.

Planning Decisions:

06/10/0256/F – to provide externally sited air source heat pumps to each of 7 previously approved dwellings at the old Hales house site – re-submission. GYBC Approved.

06/10/0245/F – Single storey rear extension to form living room to residence at Winterton Fish Bar. GYBC Approved.

06/10/0292/F – Ground floor extension and new first floor over part of bungalow at Eastern Lights, Beach Road. GYBC Approved.

06/10/0284/F – Proposed replacement dwelling – revised application at 47 Long Beach Estate. GYBC Approved.

Finance:

- A quarterly review of the accounts was conducted by Cllr Hodds.
- Playing field – Quotes for new flooring in the toilets and referee room are being obtained. Once they have all been received they will be discussed at the next Finance meeting and recommendations can then be made to the full Parish Council.
- Three quotes for new urinals in the men's toilet have been received and it was resolved to approve the cost of £364.24; work will start very soon.
- Replacement goal posts – there are some top rails at the playing field which can be used but supports are needed. This is being looked into by Cllr Blayney.
- It was resolved to approve the emptying of the two bins on the playing field by GYBC at a cost of £55 per year.
- The Methodist clock – a quote has been received; following a discussion Cllr Harrison will contact the repair specialist to clarify what work needs to be carried out to keep the clock working.
- Donation requests are acknowledged and will be reviewed twice yearly.

New lease for the Village Hall: Following agreement from the Village Hall Committee that the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Parish Council can sign the new lease it will be signed by them on Tuesday 20 July 2010.

Two paths are really overgrown with weeds and following a short discussion it was agreed to contact NCC and ask if they are responsible for cutting back the weeds. The Clerk will contact NCC.

There is a large pot hole on the bend at Mill Corner on the left hand side coming from Hemsby. This will be reported by the Clerk.

Residents concerns:

A gentleman from a reputable charity knocked on a resident's door; even though there was a notice stating no cold calling, and would not go away as requested but kept on asking for a donation. The Charity in question has been sent a letter asking them to ensure that their representatives observe the requests of residents and the notices on their doors.

A resident has been unable to get insurance cover on their property due to a flood risk. The Environment Agency have been contacted and information has been received which will be circulated to the Councillors.

Neville Wacey kindly donated an old fishing net to the church, which turned out to be of great length! It is now covering the base of the north wall.

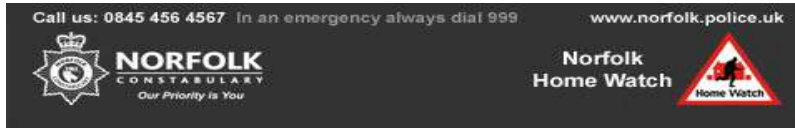
We are grateful to Adrian Wright coming to us from Essex to give a talk on the East coast floods on Friday 9 July. Adrian talked us through the complicated subject of why exactly flooding occurs. He then talked about the sequence of events that made up the East coast floods of 1953. Guests shared experiences of the floods in Canvey Island and Felixstowe.

It was good to see the church full for the wonderful concert given by the Chorus of St Cecilia on Wednesday 7 July, with spiritual numbers, light classics and songs from the shows under the direction of Matthew Hardy.



On Sea Sunday we were blessed with very fine weather and a full church once again. A presentation was made to Jane Jackson our organist to mark 25 years as organist of Winterton church. She was presented with an enormous bouquet and a framed print of Winterton church and the congregation sang 'Thank you for the music' led by St Mary's Singers. They also sang 'Be still my soul' and 'I will follow him'. The 901 Troop of Marine Cadets were in attendance with the band playing before and after the service. Hemsby Lifeboat were also there with the broads rescue boat. The Mayor and Mayoress of Great Yarmouth were also in attendance. Floral tributes were laid at Fisherman's Corner and at Fr Porter's memorial in memory of those lost at sea.





Householders living in the borough of Great Yarmouth are being urged not to make it easy for potential thieves this summer. Officers are advising people to pay extra attention to home and vehicle security with the onset of longer evenings and warmer weather. Detective Inspector Sarah Pettengell, from Great Yarmouth CID, said lapses in security can often give rise to opportunistic crime. She said: "By taking simple steps householders can avoid becoming a victim of crime. Burglaries are often opportunistic crimes so by removing attractive and expensive items from display, such as laptops and car keys, householders can help prevent these crimes from occurring. During the summer months thieves will also look for gaps in home security such as doors and windows left open. Norfolk is an extremely safe place to live and your chances of being a victim of such crime still remain extremely low but you should look at your home through a thief's eyes. Don't become an easy target". Norfolk Constabulary offers the following advice to residents:

- Householders are reminded to keep windows and doors locked and secure at all times, whether they are inside or outside the home.
- Attention should be paid to the security of sheds and garages and to the property stored within as these often contain expensive items such as lawn mowers, power tools and sports equipment. Use good quality locks and fit internal grills to the windows.
- People should mark their belongings – this will make them less attractive to steal and make it more difficult for them to be sold on.
- Be a good neighbour – If anyone is spotted acting suspiciously in your neighbourhood, call the police.

Det Insp Pettengell added that residents should be vigilant when dealing with cold callers to their property – and not to let them inside. "Always ask for identification from any unexpected callers and do not to let anyone in if you are not comfortable with who they are. Councils and utilities companies will generally contact householders by telephone or letter if they plan to carry out repairs rather than make unsolicited calls," said Det Insp Pettengell.

DOGS ON THE DUNES – A PLEA FROM A VILLAGE RESIDENT

There is an increasing problem with owners who do not clear up after their dogs on the Dunes. Firstly, it contravenes the Byelaws of the Dunes which is a SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) and also the Dogs (fouling of land) Act 2001. As well as being very anti-social it also has an environmental effect, affecting the nutrient balance of the eco-system by encouraging the growth of coarse grasses which shade out the natural rarer species of the Dunes. This is becoming apparent already in some areas. The Adder problem can also be increased as they are attracted to the lizards who are attracted to the flies who are attracted to the "dog dumps".

In order to maintain this very special area for our children and grandchildren to enjoy, please clear up after your dogs, it is your responsibility; don't leave it to the Rangers. And PLEASE don't bag it and leave it preserved for prosperity by throwing it, neatly bagged, into the undergrowth.
