Six residents and Cllr Weymouth were welcomed to the Parish Council meeting which took place on Thursday 18th April 2013 in the Village Hall.

1. Public discussion:

- A resident noted that households immediately affected by the scheduled Hemsby Road closure had not been notified by Highways although the Chairman noted that he had informed the residents himself. It was agreed to raise this with Cllr Shrimplin.
- To receive a report from the County/Borough Councillors
 - Cllr Weymouth noted that she had called a meeting of the coastal group for Hemsby and Winterton on Wednesday 25th April at 7.00 p.m. in Hemsby Village Hall to clarify issues surrounding coastal erosion particularly in Hemsby and to discuss potential solutions. The meeting would be open to the public and a notice would be put on the Parish Council notice board advertising the meeting.

2. To receive a report from the PCSO:

PC Potter had sent his apologies and the Chairman noted the following:

• There had been 2 assaults and one criminal damage during the month. The Chairman noted that PC Steve Potter would be leaving the area to be replaced by PC Richard Bennett.

3. To consider planning applications and review planning permissions: -

Applications:

06/13/0130/F Conversion and extension of existing agricultural barns to 3 residential dwellings Barns at Low Farm, Somerton Road. **No objections**.

06/13/0151/F Proposed internal alterations, extensions and formation of rooms in roof space for disabled persons. Harmony Patch Bush Road. The Chairman noted that a similar application had been considered in January 2013. The Parish Council again voted unanimously **not** to approve this application for the following reasons: overdevelopment of the site; unneighbourly; out of keeping with the surrounding properties; objection from neighbours.

After completion of all the preparatory work we are delighted to be able to confirm that the repair work to the Church Tower is now starting. The contacts have been signed, scaffold been arriving and Monday April 22nd will see the workmen swing into action. There will be areas cordoned off, graves and memorials protected against damage and warning signs in place. Church will remain accessible and in use throughout the "Thank you?" I hear you question, but why? Ok, it is me that gets up and end date is February 3rd 2014.

We will answer any queries should they arise and keep you informed of the progress in future newsletters. Fund raising will continue throughout the year.

Rector's Ramblings...

Well, I have completed my first Christmas and first Easter with you all. Christmas was awesome in so many ways and Easter was a series of emotional and joyful occasions. Walking around Hemsby in a bitter wind on Good Friday with a very well behaved, "Miracle" pony (thanks to the Peasley family), Good Friday at East Somerton ruins followed by Stations of the Cross around Winterton led by members of the 901 Troop of Marine Cadets - those poor wind players in that freezing wind and the brave drummers keeping the pace, thank you so much for being there! Holy Saturday in a darkened Hemsby Church and then the joy of Easter Day at dawn on Winterton beach, the quiet beauty of Easter at Horsey and my final Easter offering back at Hemsby: all unique and very moving experiences. THANK YOU!!

does that Master of Ceremonies bit at the front of the church or leads on the beach (next year you can all stand facing the wind, I have learned my lesson!), but in the end without you, the congregation made up of many unique individuals; without you there can be no Church and no community of faith. So yes, thank YOU for being there.



Of course Easter and other festivals tend to draw many ordinary folk just like you and me, into church. At other times the community of faith operates as a community based on the faith that Christ will help us to grow in spiritual strength and will equip us to go out and encourage others to take up the mantle of Christians past and present. That becomes more difficult as the gospels according to Asda, Tesco, Sainsbury's etc seem to shine more brightly in people's lives. But those shopping communities are transient where Christ's community is permanent and has been for many centuries. That permanence can only continue and stand a chance of growth if we are willing to embrace the newcomer no matter how sceptical we might be about their reason for attending church. My Easter break was spent visiting the tiny island of Iona which lies at the south western tip of Mull on the west coast of Scotland. In my previous parishes I often used the liturgies (acts of worship) from this cradle of Christianity on these shores. The words speak of the diverse nature of humanity, acceptance, reaching out to others and the church as Christ's, not ours. These attributes are often lost in our very regimented liturgies; for in being so constrained we can lose the key message of hope for our faith communities and salvation for all. The message that we are all Church and that just as we have been accepted by Christ so we are called to be accepting of others, where they are and how they are.Iona is often called The Touching Place; I hope and pray that our churches and that WE as Church can also be Touching Places for all comers; that touched they will


feel welcomed and loved.
