WINTERTON ON SEA PARISH COUNCIL - THURSDAY 21 APRIL 2011

Twelve residents were welcomed to the Parish Council meeting which took place on Thursday 21st April 2011 in the Church Rooms.

Public Discussion:

- A resident complained that there seemed to be increasing intolerance of young people in the village and that there had been incidences of verbal abuse for no apparent reason. Cllr Blake stated that goal posts and a basketball net had been put up at the playing field for the younger residents and there should be no discrimination towards young people in the village. It was agreed that the resident would report any similar incidences to one of the Councillors so that the situation could be monitored.
- Cllr Weymouth reported that the Shoreline Management Plan had indicated that the section of coast from Winterton to Newport would be classified as "managed retreat" which was good news since this was better than "no active intervention.

Planning Applications

06/11/0155/F. Alterations and extension at rear to form kitchen/diner with mono-pitched roof. **2 May Cottages, Back Road**. Cllr Blake reported that he had spoken to the next-door neighbour who had no objections. No objections were raised.

06/11/0157/F. Single storey extension to front, two-storey extension to rear, erection of garage and oil tank enclosure. 13 Council House, Somerton Road. It was noted that an objection had been raised for the following reasons: (i) the front would not be in character with the rest of the houses; (ii) the site would be overdeveloped; (iii) the front of the new extension would be very close to the footpath and (iv) there could be potential loss of light to neighbouring properties.

06/11/0159/F. Proposed single storey rear extension and two storey side extension. Amity, Old Chapel Road. No objections were raised.

06/11/0127/F. Proposed sub-division of garden and construction of semi-detached bungalows for holiday use. Sunny View, The Craft. It was noted that an objection had been raised for the following reasons: (i) overdevelopment of site. (ii) building in a back garden and (iii) sufficient holiday homes in village.

06/10/0774/F. Variation of Condition 2 of PP 06/06/0694/F. To allow construction of dormer/gables at rear of units 6,5,3,2, & 1. North Market Road (former Thermaglow Factory). It was noted that an objection had been raised for the reason that concerns about privacy to neighbouring properties had not addressed. Cllr Blake noted that GYBC Planning had subsequently rejected this application at its meeting on 19th April.

Planning Decisions – None received

P.C.S.O.

It was noted that PCSO Adam Rowland had replaced Roger Bellward and that he would be responsible for all the coastal villages from Caister to Winterton. Cllr Blake noted that PCSO hoped to be able to attend Parish Council meetings on a quarterly basis.

WINTERTON PARISH CHURCH

From the Registers:

The funeral of the late **Irene Martin** of Green Hedges, The Craft, Winterton, who died on 11 February 2011 took place at Gorleston Crematorium on 1 March 2011. Unusually for her age, Irene was a great fan of rock music and at her funeral service music by Eric Clapton, Queen and Led Zeppelin (Stairway to heaven) was played. Irene was born in Elland, West Yorkshire and during the war she served with the Royal Signals, working with morse code. She had lived in Winterton with her late husband Cledwyn since 1990.

The funeral of the late **Betty Humphreys** of George Beck Road, Winterton, who died on 11 March aged 89, took place at Gorleston Crematorium on Wednesday 23 March. The service was conducted by the Revd Charles Powles.

The ashes of the late **Ivy George**, formerly of Winterton and latterly a resident at Carisbrooke House Residential Care Home, Great Yarmouth, who died on 28 February aged 91 were interred in the churchyard on 31 March.

The funeral of the late **Peter Harman**, aka 'Tuddy' who died on 23 March 2011, aged 72, took place at the parish church on 8 April. Peter was a regular at the Fisherman's Return with his dog Mutley, sat in his stool at the end of the bar. There is a photograph of him there beside his seat. We are very grateful to the family for asking that donations in memory of Peter be given to the restoration of the church.

There were no spare seats at the parish church on 14 April for the funeral of the late **Coral Warnes** who died on 31 March aged 65. Coral had fought a determined battle against cancer and requested that her funeral service be a humorous one. Coral was a much-loved woman, blessed with a great sense of fun and love of life. Memories were shared of the pram races from Winterton to Martham and Hemsby, when Coral joined others in dressing up as a bunny girl or a St Trinians schoolgirl. We are grateful to the family for asking that donations in memory of Coral be shared between the Church Restoration Fund and the Sandra Chapman Unit at the James Paget Hospital.

The funeral of the late **Betty Brown** (nee Lubbock) who died on 3 April aged 77 took place at the parish church on Tuesday 19 April. Betty was born in Mautby, trudging 4 miles to school at Runham every day over muddy fields. Betty was the widow of the late Roy Brown. She lived in Winmer Avenue before suffering a severe stroke, which meant that she required constant care at the Heathers Nursing Home in Bradwell for the last 8 years.

We send our condolences to all their families.

Thank you to the organisers of the monthly **Quiz Night** at the Hermanus, which recently raised £106.50 for the church restoration fund.

The Lent Lunches held at The Church Room in Winterton and the Barn Room, Hemsby raised £438 for the Diocesan Lent Project, **'Nurses for Nepal'** raising funds to train nurses and provide an ambulance in a deprived region of that country. Thank you to all who assisted and supported.

There is a one-off **non-refundable fee of £5 for all sellers** which goes to Village Hall funds. The Sale Map will be drawn up to show the addresses of all those who will be selling from their garage or yard. Copies of the map will be on sale from the Village Hall on the day of the sale. Light refreshments will be on sale in the Hall. We intend to advertise this event widely – with adverts being placed in the local press and posters being displayed in shops in Winterton and neighbouring villages.

So for all of us who have items to sell – bric-a-brac, furniture, books, clothes, garden tools, baby equipment, toys etc, etc – this is the ideal opportunity to clear out your loft, garden shed, cupboards and garage and turn those excess items into cash without having to move more than a few feet from your own front door.

30 residents attended the Public Meeting on 12 April to hear about the Domestic Fuel Bulk Buying scheme and there was interest in forming a Winterton Group. If you want to register as a Member, please complete the form and return to Gill Lack at 11 Marram Court, North Market Road who has kindly volunteered to collect Membership applications and be the point of contact for the Group with NRCC. The membership fee for the Group to join the scheme is £15 and it is intended to charge £1 to each household that wish to join the Group, with any additional money raised being distributed amongst Village Groups. If you have any further questions about the scheme, you can contact NRCC on 01362 698216 or visit their website www.norfolkrcc.org.uk

The Scheme

The scheme is a partnership between Norfolk RCC and AF Affinity. This allows it to benefit from one of the largest agricultural purchasing groups. Our aim is to try and provide rural communities with cheaper fuel. Proceeds also support Norfolk RCC community development services. Our prices are consistently low but we cannot guarantee to always be the lowest. In 2010 the average saving was 8%, the lowest being 4% and the highest 16%.

How does it work?

To benefit from the scheme it is necessary to set up a local group. We provide a basic group constitution and relevant forms. The group needs to become a member of Norfolk RCC, this costs £15 per year, then simply register applicants onto the scheme. Individuals will need to provide their name, address, email address if they have one, phone number and identify a payment preference. They will also need to sign a data protection statement so this information can be passed between the local group, Norfolk RCC and AF Affinity. We will process this information and you'll receive a confirmation letter or email. At this point you can start benefiting from the scheme but there is no obligation to buy.

How do I pay?

You can pay by credit/debit card over the phone or by Direct Debit. Any card payments will be held and adjusted to reflect any anomolies such as additional extra bulk discount or if your tank couldn't accommodate your full order.

Extra Discounts

There is the opportunity to save even more on orders that are transacted together. For example if 10 members of the Group order 500 litres of oil, instead of receiving the price per litre for 500 litres you receive the price for 5,000 litres. Order before 12:00 noon on the first working day of the month to receive the multi-purchase discount. Local groups can co-ordinate orders for specifc months to maximise savings. Order at any other time and you will still receive the standard discount price.

How to Order?

Once you have a local scheme and have been registered you can order by calling 01603 881888.

<u>Extra Info</u>

This scheme has a number of advantages over other models. It doesn't require the whole group to order together, nor does it require payment to be made by a single person. Members also benefit from the county-wide nature of the scheme increasing the savings achieved from bulk buying. In addition, individuals can become Norfolk RCC members giving access to an increased range of products as part of our members buying scheme.

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLAN

As mentioned in the last Newsletter, our Plan is now under review. We have contacted all residents currently assisting us should an emergency arise but we could always do with more help. To all who have already agreed to help, please accept our grateful thanks.

Perhaps it is timely to remind everyone as to the reasoning behind our Plan especially as we have had many new residents to our village since the Plan was set up 2 years ago. It was developed (in conjunction with Great Yarmouth Borough Council) to provide a localised response to any potential emergency. For instance, our weather is sometimes unpredictable, sometimes severe. Last winter's weather throughout the UK highlighted how we might be vulnerable to a variety of hazards. This could result, for example, in damage to property and residents left without drinking water or electricity for lengthy periods.

In such situations people tend to show true community spirit by offering support and assistance to each other. Our Plan is built on this community spirit. By having one, we should be able to manage any emergency effectively and recover quickly. If you are not already involved, <u>please</u> register your interest to contribute your time and skills or identify yourself as potentially needing assistance in an emergency. Above all, we hope you will be reassured that in the unlikely event an emergency occurs that a Plan is in place. Any information you supply will be treated as confidential – it will be kept secure and only used in an emergency by those who need to know.
