In your Kitchen and Garden

September is the perfect time to pick blackberries - in the garden if you are lucky enough to have them or to take the kids out searching the hedgerows. Here is a recipe for a moist and fruity cake - a great way to get the kids to eat fruit.

Blackberry & Apple Loaf

250g SR flour	175g butter	175g light muscovado sugar
$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp cinnamon	2 rounded tbsp demerera sugar	2 large beaten eggs
1 sm eating apple, quartered	grated zest of 1 orange	1 tsp baking powder
	225g blackberries	

Heat the oven to 180C/Gas Mk 4. Butter and line a large loaf tin. In a large bowl, rub together flour, butter and muscovado sugar till like breadcrumbs. Measure out 5 tbsp of mixture into a small bowl, add cinnamon and demerera sugar and set aside for the topping. Coarsely grate the apple down to the core and mix with the eggs and orange zest and set aside. Stir in baking powder into the rubbed-in mixture, then lightly stir in the egg mixture. Gently fold in three-quarters of the berries with metal spoon, trying not to break them. Spoon into the loaf tin and level. Scatter rest of the berries on top then sprinkle over the reserved topping. Bake for around 1 hr 15 mins. Check after 50 mins and if browning too much cover loosely with foil. Leave in tin for 30 mins then turn out to cool.

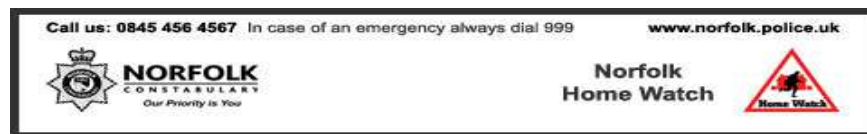

Norfolk Constabulary and Anglian Water are working in partnership to crackdown on bogus water officials. As part of a national initiative by the UK Water Industry, concerned residents can now call a helpline number and verify the identity of the person calling at their home. By encouraging the public to call the helpline, the Operation Radar team and Anglian Water aim to safeguard people in their homes and reduce the risk of distraction burglary offences.

DS Pete Jessop said; "In the past year there have been 16 incidents in Norfolk involving callers claiming to be from the Water Board and stating their need to enter the property. The phone number can be used to verify the authenticity of officials and minimise the risk of a crime occurring. If a cold caller visits your home claiming they need to enter the property urgently then be cautious. There are very few circumstances where someone would need to be given access in this manner. Check the identity of the caller and make them wait – if they're genuine they will not mind."

Martyn Oakley, Customer Services Director at Anglian Water said: "We at Anglian Water take the protection of our customers very seriously. All our staff and contractors carry identification and we have a dedicated phone line for customers to confirm the identity and seek reassurance that any visitor is genuine. If a customer receives an unexpected doorstep visitor we urge them to check their ID and then call the Company to make sure they are who they say they are. All of our employees and contractors will be happy to wait while you do this."

The World's Biggest Coffee Morning is back and this year the charity needs your help even more than before due to the economic climate. Can you help them? If so all you need to do is register to take part and you will receive a free fundraising pack so you can help even more people living with cancer. This year's 'World's Biggest Coffee Morning' event takes place on **Friday 24 September**. PARISH COUNCIL MEETING – THURSDAY 19 AUGUST 2010

Five residents were welcomed to the meeting and it was stated that the meeting is held in accordance with the Parish Council Standing Orders and Code of Conduct.

- Flooding on Playing Field – a resident asked if the Parish Council would write and ask Mr Buxton of Burnley Hall Estate to dig out the ditches that run alongside the playing field in Low Road to prevent the flooding of the playing field after heavy rain.
- A resident asked if the maps on sale for the yearly garage sale to raise funds for the Village Hall could be sold earlier on the day. Following a brief discussion this matter will be put on the agenda for the next Village Hall Committee meeting.

The following Planning Applications and Decisions were reviewed by the Parish Council.

Planning Applications

06/10/0481/F - Erection of garden room and enlargement of kitchen at 1 Pratts Buildings, King Street. The Parish Council unanimously objected to this application on the grounds of the right of access, a well in the area and the erection of a garden room and enlargement of kitchen is not in character with the rest of the properties.

06/10/0482/F – Demolish existing garage and erection of new garage at 54 Bulmer Lane. Winterton Parish Council had no objections.

Planning Decisions

Trees at the Lighthouse, The Holway – to reduce crown of two sycamore and one goat willow trees by approximately 30% and remove low growth where over fence line. GYBC Approved.

06/10/0356/F – Two storey extension at 27 Bulmer Lane. GYBC Approved.

PCSO, Roger Bellward, was present and gave his monthly report and reminded residents to lock up sheds, windows and doors etc and keep valuables out of sight.

Committees and responsibilities – the Chairman read out the proposed changes to the committees and Councillors' responsibilities.

Health Trainer Rural Tour - Village Health Checks

During September the Great Yarmouth and Waveney Health Trainers will be offering residents a variety of **FREE** and **CONFIDENTIAL** health checks including; height, weight, Body Mass Index (BMI), lung tests (measuring Carbon Monoxide – for smokers) and blood pressure. Individuals undertaking a health check will have the opportunity to sign up to services, for example, if you would like to quit smoking, eat more healthily or become more active the Community Health Trainers can offer support, information and help to maintain motivation towards achieving their goals. We also cover the areas of stress management, sexual health matters, drug and alcohol information and support. Research shows that having a healthier lifestyle can help reduce the risks of developing illnesses or conditions later in life including high blood pressure, heart disease, heart attacks, strokes, type 2 diabetes and a number of cancers.
